

Cake and Corvettes

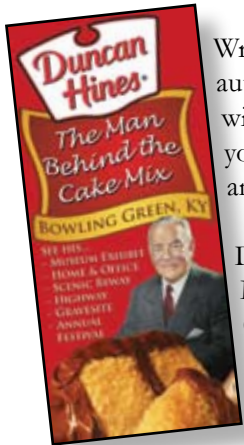

Can you have your cake and Corvette, too? You can in Bowling Green, Kentucky. Your first day begins with a tour of the General Motors Corvette Assembly Plant. Every Corvette in America is made right here.

Now you'll head for the world class National Corvette Museum. There are one-of-a-kind, mind condition Corvettes that look fast even when they're sitting still!

Then it's on to historic Fountain Square where you can browse, shop and eat lunch at some of Bowling Green's finest businesses.

The next step is Riverview, a pre-Civil War home tour that presents an elegant interpretation of a Victorian family and their home of the 1860 to 1890 period.



Wrap up the day at Teresa's Restaurant for a genuine, authentic home-style dinner. The locals love it and you will, too! While filling your belly, get ready to hang on to your seat because it's time for down home country music and humor, Southern style!

Day two takes you to the Historic Railpark and Train Museum where you can board the Duncan Hines Dining Car. Next enter the restored L&N Passenger Depot to step back in time as you learn the history of the railroad through interactive exhibits.

We'll now move on to the Kentucky Museum which houses a rich collection of artifacts, materials and antiques relating to life in Kentucky. Don't miss the Duncan Hines exhibit, complete with personal belongings of the 'man behind the cake mix.'

Lunch is served at Shaker Tavern, then it's on to the Shaker Museum where you'll hear about the simplicity and drive for perfection by this communal religious sect.

During dinner at Split Tree BBQ, you'll learn about one of our most famous citizens... Duncan Hines. You'll learn that he was, indeed, much more than a cake mix!

Day three will begin with a boat ride in Lost River Cave. This will be a memory for a lifetime! For lunch it will be the 1818 Mariah Moore House, Bowling Green's oldest brick structure.

When you depart Bowling Green that afternoon, you'll do so on the Duncan Hines Scenic Byway that will take you past the former Duncan Hines Home and Office.
